

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Dear Friends and Benefactors, Greetings from the Diocese of Thuckalay!

Today we are celebrating the Solemnity of the Assumption of our blessed mother and the Independence day of Our Beloved Country India. The Catholic Church teaches that Mary's body was glorified immediately at the end of her earthly life, unlike other mortal beings who must wait until the end of the world for bodily resurrection. This divine gift is seen as fitting for the mother of Jesus. It's important to note that the Assumption differs from Christ's Ascension - while Jesus ascended to Heaven by His power, Mary was taken up by God's power.

The Magnificat reflects Mary's embrace of God's greatness, which stands in contrast to the fear that God might restrict human freedom - a fear often seen as a core element of original sin and a temptation of the modern age. Mary's example encourages believers to recognise God's greatness as essential for human dignity and as a guide for resolving disputes.

Mary becomes a model of one who lived immersed in God's word, which gave her wisdom, goodness, and strength. By affirming Mary's closeness to humanity despite her heavenly status, she becomes a mother figure to whom people can always turn. This aspect of Marian devotion provides comfort and inspiration to many believers.

The Church sees scriptural support for the Assumption in passages that emphasise Mary's perfect union with Jesus' destiny as the Saviour. This union is evident throughout Scripture, from Jesus' birth to after his death, as seen in Mary's miraculous conception of Jesus, her prompting of Jesus during his first miracle at Cana, her witness to his crucifixion, and her presence at Pentecost after Jesus' death.

The timing of the dogma's formal definition in 1950, coming in the wake of World War II and at the onset of the Cold War, can be seen as a spiritual affirmation of hope and the ultimate triumph of good over evil. It offers a powerful counter-narrative to the materialistic and often hopeless worldviews that gained prominence in the 20th century.

15 August also marks India's Independence Day, commemorating the nation's liberation from British colonial rule in 1947. This event was the culmination of a long and often difficult struggle for freedom, led by figures such as Mahatma Gandhi, Jawaharlal Nehru, and countless others who dedicated their lives to the cause of Indian sovereignty.



The path to independence was complex, involving strategies of non-violent resistance, civil disobedience, and negotiations with the British government. While independence brought joy and pride to millions, it was also accompanied by the painful partition of the subcontinent into India and Pakistan, leading to one of the largest mass migrations in human history and tragic communal violence.

Prime Minister Nehru's famous "Tryst with Destiny" speech captured the spirit of the moment: "At the stroke of the midnight hour, when the world sleeps, India will awake to life and freedom." This moment marked a major shift in global politics and inspired anti-colonial movements worldwide.

While celebrating its independence and achievements, modern India also faces numerous challenges. These include threats to its unity in diversity, concerns about media independence, economic pressures on the poor, ongoing border issues, disparities in education access, high unemployment rates, environmental degradation, and social issues such as human trafficking and corruption.

The teachings of saintly educators like St Philip Neri and St John Bosco, who made their students become good Christians and honest citizens, can inspire us in this task. As educators and citizens, we are called to build bridges rather than walls and to contribute significantly to uplifting the poor and marginalised.

While the Assumption of Mary and India's Independence Day may seem unrelated, they both represent significant moments of transformation and hope. They remind us of the diverse ways in which human history unfolds, encompassing both spiritual and political dimensions. Both events speak to the human quest for dignity, freedom, and transcendence.

I wish each and every one of you a very Happy Feast of Assumption and Happy Independence Day. May our blessed mother intercede for each one of you and your family.

It was heartening to see thousands of faithful coming to the shrine during the ten days of celebrations to pray and receive blessings from God through the intercession of St. Alphonsa. Almost all the priests and faithful from our diocese were present for the various spiritual events, especially during the Foranelevel Holy Qurbana celebrations. On July 26, 2024, Most Rev. Dr. Albert Anasthas, Bishop of the Diocese of Kuzhithurai, visited the shrine and celebrated the Holy Qurbana. Over five thousand faithful from different rites participated. On July 28, 2024, the last day of the feast, the faithful, the religious, and the priests from all our parishes reached the shrine by 9:30 am. Rev. Fr. Thomas Powathuparampil led the novena in honor of the saint. This was followed by a solemn concelebrated Holy Qurbana, with Mar Paul Alappattu, Bishop of the Diocese of Ramanathapuram, as the main celebrant. Bishop Mar George Rajendran SDB delivered the homily during the Holy Qurbana. After the Holy Qurbana, there was a procession and an agape meal for all the pilgrims. In the evening, another Holy Qurbana was celebrated. Soon after, the flag was lowered, and the celebrations came to a happy conclusion.

SMYM Animators' Leadership Meeting

The Diocesan Animators' meeting was held on July 6, 2024, at the Kalluvilai SMYM office at 2:00 pm. Twenty-five religious and lay animators participated in the meeting. The director, Fr. Joseph Santhosh, spoke about the peculiarities of today's youth and ways to interact with them and gather them into groups. Following the diocesan animators' meeting, forane-level animators' meetings were

held at Manjalumoodu on July 10, 2024, at Soosaipuram on July 21, and at Pilankalai on July 27. The animators received orientation on youth animations and meetings. They were also asked to submit monthly reports from their respective units at the end of each month.





Changing the Way We Care: A KKSSS Project Evaluation



The Changing the Way We Care Project, funded by CRS, aims to reunite vulnerable children with their families and provide support systems to these families through government and private linkage programs. As part of the annual review, on 23 July 2024 the CRS team visited target areas, including Kattathurai parish, where the project is successfully running. They met with Fr. Abilash, the parish priest, and parish council members to evaluate project progress. The parish council in Kattathurai is actively supporting children in need, providing assistance with studies and daily needs through Vincent De Paul and other pious associations. The review team consisted of Fr. Thomas Poovathummoottil, Fr. Subin Puthenpurackal from KKSSS, Fr. Celestine, the CRS consultant for this project, and CRS representatives. Currently, KKSSS supports over 300 children through this project.

During the meeting, it was suggested that Uraviyams should be functioning in all the parishes and that parish priests ensure the active participation of all families in every Uraviyam and conduct Uraviyam meetings regularly.

Junior Priests' Formation Journey

A two-day ongoing formation program was held for the Junior Priests at Sangamam on July 29-30, 2024. All Junior Priests – Frs. Abilash, Shijo, Toji, Jose Paul, Mahesh, Georgekutty, Prince, Ajin C., Liju, Linto, and Sanjo – were present for the orientation course. The programme was inaugurated by Bishop Mar George Rajendran SDB. On the first day, Rev. Fr. Peter Arockiaraj, SDB, Academic Coordinator of Don Bosco College, Keela Eral, conducted a session on

priestly life and ministry and the challenges faced by new generation priests. In the evening, Curia members, along with Bishop, met with the junior priests, who shared their pastoral experiences and concerns. On the next day, July 30, Rev. Fr. Joshy Kulathumkal led a session on the clarification of pastoral issues from the canonical aspects, followed by a session led by Rev. Fr. Johnsilal Arackaparampil, who addressed all account-related doubts of the priests.


